








Seed Cleaning

After so much seed collection, it's time for seed cleaning! Seed that comes in from the field isn't perfect, so we 'clean' the seed to determine how much we have and ensure it's ready to seed into new prairies, woodlands, and oak savannas. We utilize a hammer mill to break seed clusters apart and then a fanning mill to separate chaff from seed. No prior experience is necessary for this, but participants will need to tolerate noise and dust with provided PPE. Learn more and sign up by clicking on the seed packets!



Our seed storage facility is packed full! We expect that this year may be another record-breaking year thanks to our volunteers.



Interested in growing native plants for the community?

A workshop will be held on **November 6, from 1-3pm** at the Lussier Family Heritage Center for interested volunteers. **You must register in advance. Max number of participants is 15.**

Native plants have tremendous water quality benefits and increase habitat and food sources for pollinators. Because of this, the Dane County Land and Water Resources Department has a native plant growing program to provide a source of free native plants for schools and community groups. Dane County will provide all of the supplies except the potting mix which the volunteers are asked to purchase themselves. Volunteers need a sunny, outdoor space to grow the plants. Walking Iron Seed Collection



Friends Group Feature Friends of Indian Lake (FOIL)

The Friends of Indian Lake are an incredible asset to one of the largest parks in the DCP system. In addition to holding volunteer workdays and the very popular "Indian Lake Train Run" at Indian Lake, they also help support the Halfway Prairie Wildlife Area - which lies a mere hop across the road. FOIL provides funding for goats to come out and help remove (graze) invasive species in the farm ruins at Halfway Prairie. A single goat can eat 8 pounds of vegetation a day making them super stars at clearing out thick invasive species in rocky areas that cannot be managed with mowing.

FOIL leads a number of other projects to enhance Indian Lake County Park.


