


# Greetings!

### **Seed Cleaning**

After so much seed collection, it's time for seed cleaning! Seed that comes in from the field isn't perfect, so we 'clean' the seed to ensure it is usable and ready to help us reseed restored areas. We utilize a hammer mill to break seed clusters apart and then a fanning mill to separate chaff from seed. No prior experience is necessary for this, but participants will need to tolerate noise and dust with provided PPE. Learn more and sign up here!

A StoryWalk® engages park visitors and youth in both outdoor exploration and literacy; laminated pages from a children's book are attached to plastic corrugated yard signs and installed along a trail or walkway. As you stroll down the trail, you're directed to the next page in the story. By adding a StoryWalk® to our parks, we hope that visitors will connect with nature in a new way, bringing together the wonders of reading, the health benefits of nature, and the exploration of the natural world.

# Friends Group Feature Friends of Donald Park




Donald County Park is located in Dane County just 15 miles southwest of Madison. The Friends of Donald Park, Inc. promotes and supports the development and passive use of Donald County Park through programs and activities that provide education, restoration and preservation of cultural, natural and historic resources representing Dane County's rural heritage for present and future generations. This Friends group has over 100 members, but you do not need to be a member to volunteer! Listed below are the many opportunities available.

#### Volunteer Opportunities Include:

- Maintaining bluebird trails and records
- Maintaining the trail system (mowing, brush cutting, trails repair)
- Assisting with visiting school groups
- Collecting and spreading prairie seeds
- Helping with special events (baked goods, greeting, registration, food sales, set up and more)
- History/archaeology (research, digs)
- Administration (board member, committee work)
- Writing (grants, newsletters, educational materials)
- Park service projects—young people earn advancement toward prestigious awards including Eagle Scout rank in Boy Scouts or Gold Awards in Girl Scouts



# Volunteer Spotlight Jack Lawton

"Jack" of all trades!

Introducing Jack Lawton, a volunteer with Dane County Parks since 2015!
Jack has worked for the State of Wisconsin in various capacities for quite a long time - more than 40 years in fact!



Most recently Jack worked for what was then called the WI Office of State Employment Relations as the Administrator of the Division of Merit Recruitment and Selection, following his role as Director of Human Resources at the Wisconsin DOT. About 50 years ago he volunteered with UW Hoofers to help establish ski trails in and around tracts of land that became part of the larger Indian Lake County Park. For those of you who use those trails, you'll know it's a pretty amazing network. Jack and his wife, Bonnie, currently volunteer with the City of Madison at Westmoorland Park and have been integral in the management of several pocket prairies alongside sections of the Southwest Commuter Path. In preparation to be burn bosses for those pocket prairies, they became acquainted with the burn trainings hosted by Wayne Pauly, DCP Naturalist/Botanist (retired 2016). Following that training, in 2015 Jack began volunteering with Dane County Parks at several seed weighing and bagging events. After discussing with Wayne how the data for this process was organized, Jack offered his significant database experience (from his years with the State of Wisconsin) to help improve the process and make it more efficient!

In 2018 he began work on a Microsoft Access database which significantly improved how our Natural Areas staff were able to distribute select species of native seeds to certain projects. This program takes the hard work of determining what types and amounts of seed to use in a planting (based on requirements such as acreage, sunlight, soil moisture, and seeding rates) and outputs all the data onto neat, organized labels. These labels are then used by other volunteers and staff to weigh out all the seed for our projects! Though it sounds easy, prior to finalizing the first version in 2019, Jack spent well over 1,000 hours designing, programming, and working out all the bugs! Each year provides new questions and answers on how to better use the program, a challenge which Jack relishes. He's worked 400 hours on it so far this year and will continue to edit the program throughout this seed collection and cleaning

season.

Jack's creation of this program and amazing communication with our Natural Areas staff has been instrumental in streamlining many seed-related processes. In turn, this means that our prairie restorations and plantings have become even more successful! Our Natural Areas program wouldn't be where it is today without his efforts.

## August Recap!



#### Prairie Hills Community Garden



Plant grower volunteers brought back over 6,400 plants which were sorted and distributed to 50 different community groups. Since the program began in 2016, more than 29,000 plants have been distributed to 160 different groups, including schools, neighborhood associations and community centers.

### Plant for Dane! Event

Native plants have tremendous water quality benefits and increase habitat and food sources for pollinators. Because of this, the Dane County Land and Water Resources Department has started a native plant growing program to provide a source of free native plants to help schools and community groups in Dane County. These plants will be available in spring and fall each year. Spring plants are donated from community members through the Plant Dane! native plant program and fall plants are grown by local volunteers.
